

Frequently Asked Questions

1. How many papers can I submit to the Australasian Finance & Banking Conference?

Each author may present only **one paper** at the Australasian Finance and Banking Conference (AFBC).

If you wish to submit more than one paper, you will need to ensure that a co-author will be available to present the paper should it be accepted for presentation at the conference.

2. I am a PhD Student. Can I get financial assistance?

A reduced registration fee is offered to PhD Students. The conference is unable to provide any further financial assistance for PhD students.

3. Are the papers peer reviewed?

All submitted papers undergo a peer review process before being accepted for presentation at the AFBC. Full papers undergo a blind review process by a selection committee independent of the author.

4. How do I submit a paper? Can I submit via email?

Papers submitted by E-mail will not be accepted. More details are to come about the submission procedure for 2019.

5. What is the submission deadline?

Papers must be submitted by **Sunday 28 July 2019**.

6. Are there any format requirements for the paper?

The paper should follow the format that you usually see in major international journals. If you are unsure of the format, please consult with your supervisor or colleagues. There is no specific page limit. Please note that full papers must be submitted.

7. Can I revise my paper after submission and during the reviewing process?

Yes, after you submit your paper you can revise your paper. Please note that if you revise your paper during the reviewing period, it cannot be guaranteed that reviewers will see this update. You must ensure that you make all necessary revisions before the submission deadline.

8. My paper has been accepted into the conference. Can I still revise it after receiving my acceptance letter?

Yes, you may revise your paper. However, if you have already been assigned a discussant, you will need to contact them directly to ensure that they have your revised version. If you do not do this, it cannot be guaranteed that they have read the most up-to-date version of your paper.

9. What do I need to submit to the PhD Forum – a paper or my whole dissertation?

You will need to submit a complete paper relating to your dissertation/research. This paper should be similar to the papers that you have seen in journal articles.

10. I have been accepted to the main conference but I wanted to apply for the PhD Forum?

All papers that will be accepted to the PhD Forum are first accepted to the main conference. You will be separately informed if you are successful in gaining a place at the PhD Forum.
