

Frequently Asked Questions

1. How many papers can I submit to the Australasian Finance & Banking Conference?

Each author may present only **one paper** at the Australasian Finance and Banking Conference (AFBC).

If you wish to submit more than one paper, you will need to ensure that a co-author will be available to present the paper should it be accepted for presentation at the conference.

2. I am a PhD Student. Can I get financial assistance?

Only some PhD Students are accepted to the PhD Forum, we will then discuss any financial assistance after the acceptance. All PhD Students can access a discounted price upon registration.

3. Are the papers peer reviewed?

All submitted papers undergo a peer review process before being accepted for presentation at the AFBC. Full papers undergo a blind review process by a selection committee independent of the author.

4. How do I submit a paper? Can I submit via email?

Paper submissions will open soon with more information.

5. What is the submission deadline?

Papers must be submitted by **Monday 3 August 2020**

6. Are there any format requirements for the paper?

The paper should follow the format that you usually see in major international journals. If you are unsure of the format, please consult with your supervisor or colleagues. There is no specific page limit. Please note that full papers must be submitted, not just an abstract.

7. Can I revise my paper after submission and during the reviewing process?

Yes, after you submit your paper you can revise your paper on the platform. Please note that if you revise your paper during the reviewing period, it cannot be guaranteed that reviewers will see this update. You should ensure that you make all important revisions before the submission deadline. Prizes will also only be considered based on the copy submitted before the deadline.

8. My paper has been accepted into the conference. Can I still revise it after receiving my acceptance letter?

Yes, you may revise your paper. However, if you have already been assigned a discussant, you will need to contact them directly to ensure that they have your revised version. If you do not do this, it cannot be guaranteed that they have read the most up-to-date version of your paper.

9. What do I need to submit to the PhD Forum – a paper or my whole dissertation?

You will need to submit a complete paper relating to your dissertation/research. This paper should be similar to the papers that you have seen in journal articles.
